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## STRATEGIC PLAN IN ACTION

In 2022, we were able to see our strategic plan goals put in action. One of which included the diversification of Children First. This year we have been able to create our Diversity Equity and Inclusion plan. Next year, we look forward to putting in plan to actionable steps to embody.

## PEOPLE

Another goal was to build organizational capacity. Cassandra Smith started Jan. 1st, 2022, as our Administrative Assistant. She has taken that role and flown. Jon Kirkpatrick joined the Children First team Nov. 1st, 2022, as a CASA Program Support Coordinator and has been a wonderful addition to the CASA team.
After 14 years of service, Mary Joyce has stepped down from Children First to become the new Executive Director of AthFest as of January 2023. We miss her and know that it is a wonderful fit to merge her love for music and non-profit leadership.
Along with our wonderful staff members, the mission of Children First would not be able to succeed without our board. Molly Petner took on the role of Board Chair in late 2022, and we cannot wait to see what the board is able to accomplish under her leadership. We also welcomed new board members, Rachel Andrews, Jed Dews, and Katie Bemisderfer and are so excited for the fresh engagement.

## DIG DEEP TO BUILD STRONG

Increasing financial stability has also been on our strategic to-do list. One of the ways that we have implemented our fundraising plan has been our Dig Deep to Build Strong campaign where we have asked others and ourselves how we can dig deep within ourselves and our community to build a stronger Children First.
Thanks to our dedicated and enthusiastic board members, we were able to establish our First Annual Children First Gala in October 2022. At the Georgia State Botanical Gardens, we were able to see our vision come to life with wonderful food from Heirloom, great attendance, and fantastic speakers. The evening before the Auburn vs. UGA game was full of building new relationships and spending time with old friends all in an attempt to further Children First's mission. Our First Annual Gala was a success! We raised almost $\$ 20,000$. We will be holding our Second Annual Children First Gala this upcoming fall, and we hope to see you there!

## CASA: YEAR IN REVIEW

As the CASA program moved into 2022, we continued to focus on how to strengthen the structure of our program for future growth. We've hired a Program Support Coordinator and increased the number of interns to help out with projects around the office. In 2022, CASA staff supervised 13 new CASA interns! This is the highest number of interns ever accepted into the CASA program, but the outcome of their combined work has been phenomenal. Strengthening structure also means evaluating areas of weakness. With the extra support provided by new volunteers and staff, the program has been able to really consider what areas of the program need a focus. One answer has been clear: Volunteer Retention efforts.

We wouldn't be able to support the children in foster care without our amazing volunteers, and we believe retaining skilled advocates is just as important as training new ones. While a more in-depth plan is being put into place for 2023, the CASA team took small steps with big goals in mind to meet some retention targets. One of these goals has been better communication. To solve this, CASA staff now sends out a monthly newsletter that contains program information and events, upcoming in-service opportunities, and monthly CASA successes. This has helped streamline communication while allowing staff to celebrate our volunteers' victories with the entire CASA body. Our staff has made intentional efforts to add more structure to our continuing education program. A greater emphasis has been placed on increasing the variety of opportunities offered (in-person, virtual, facilitated by CASA staff or outside organization guest speakers, community events/trainings, podcasts, books, documentaries) so we can meet the needs of every type of learner.

- 86 volunteers worked a combined 10,523 hours for their CASA case.
- 1,432.72 inservice/training hours completed.

# CASA: POSTIVE OUTCOMES AND GREAT VOLUNTEERS 

## CASA SUCCESS STORY



After $31 / 2$ years in foster care due to parental substance use and the child's unmet medical needs, one youth our program served was able to be reunified with their father this past year with the support and incredible hard work of their CASA volunteer! When the CASA was assigned to the case, both biological parents were incarcerated and not working services towards reunification. The child was placed with a relative and had been diagnosed with several medical issues. The CASA quickly connected with all parties and was able to create a detailed list of services that DFCS completed for reunification to be achieved. This clear and straight forward communication helped the biological parents understand what tasks needed to be completed and what changes needed to take place to ensure the child's safety. The CASA monitored the progress of the child and biological father, while navigating difficult family dynamics, in order to provide the court with an unbiased view and recommendations. The court was able to better direct the case with the information provided, and dad received the treatment and education he needed. We were pleased to have the opportunity to recommend to the court that the child should be returned to the father's full custody. Since that return, the child has attended all needed appointments and the family is thriving. We are so proud of this family and our CASA volunteer for working together in the best interest of this child!

## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

Katie Greenway joined our program in Spring of 2019 and has demonstrated exemplary casework and commitment to our mission ever since. During her time with CASA, she has impacted 11 children, 3 CASAs, and spent numerous hours in court. Her support is inexhaustible as she carries a case, supports volunteers, and spreads the word about our work. We are so grateful to have this incredible person on our team!

Katie recently shared why she continues to volunteer: "I volunteer because CASA gives me the chance to make a positive impact in my community and be a part of something bigger than myself. Being a CASA has made me a more understanding, empathetic, and overall better person. I think CASAs play an incredibly important role in child welfare because they have the ability to fully invest in one family and make sure their needs are met and that they don't fall through the cracks of an overburdened and underfunded system. CASAs can provide a consistent and positive relationship that children in crisis can count on to be there, advocating for them every step of the way."

## SAFECARE: YEAR IN REVIEW Home Visiting Services

2022 was a significant transitional year for SafeCare. Program Director and Children First Associate Director, Mary Eleanor Joyce moved to Athfest Educates to become their new CEO. Before she did, she built up the SafeCare program in significant ways. She won several new grants, reached new donors, built a database, and deepened connections in the community through her work on committees and completing the intensive LEAD Athens program. Through all of this she onboarded Audey Lee as the new SafeCare Program Director, who was thrilled to hire Imani Scott-Blackwell as Home Visitor. As for the families we serve, we saw children returned home, DFCS cases closed, and parents able to move from emergency housing to signing leases in homes where children have their own rooms.

## 46 FAMILIES WITH SERVICES

In the past year, our SafeCare Visiting Program provided 46 families with quality, evidence based, in-home visitation and parenting education.

Kelly and Bill had been living in a long-stay hotel room for two years when they started SafeCare. DFCS had concerns about substance abuse when their daughter was born and Kelly asked about parenting resources. Both parents participated enthusiastically - their adoration for their child was delightful to witness. Thanks to emergency funding we were able to provide, the family was able to move into a three bedroom trailer, with plenty of room for their daughter and her grandmother to stay and offer support. Through community partners, we gave them a washing machine and many baby items. Their home was child proofed in a matter of weeks, they fulfilled all other requests from DFCS, and their case was closed. The family's status changed dramatically in just over two months.

## SPARC: YEAR IN REVIEW

## 2 NEW COUNTIES



The Supportive Parenting and Access Resource Center (SPARC) had a great year in 2022. The program continues to grow, and we are very excited about what is coming in the new year. This year, we had two stellar interns that worked under SPARC staff to serve clients in an effort to help out Access and Visitation programs. Because of this hard work, we were able to add two new counties and Child Support offices to our service area and are very excited to see where these new relationships will take us. This brings our total to 12 counties and 5 offices served!

## 128 NEW INTAKES

## 15+ VISITS

This past year was one of our biggest ever as far as the number of clients served. We were able to serve clients from all across the state. We had 128 new intakes, 27 more intakes than last year. This means that we made contact with 128 new non-custodial parents in an effort to increase their parenting relationship with their children. For these 128, we were able to facilitate over 15 direct visits while also encouraging communication between parents to help
 set up more visits in the future.

## OVER 100 LEGITIMATIONS

We were able to assist over 100 non-custodial fathers with the legitimation process. This will lead to them becoming legal fathers and increasing their rights and ability to have a relationship with their children.

## UPCOMING

We are excited about new opportunities in the coming year. We will begin offering mediation services to not only our clients in the Access and Visitation program, but to others in our community as well. We are also looking to expand our team in the coming year as well. Thank you for your support of Children First and all of the work you do for our community.
